
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Pony Express Territory Celebrates Nevada's 150th Birthday.

Spring Wings Birds Festival Takes Flight in Fallon!

Over 280 bird species migrate west to one of the most significant and internationally recognized wetlands, Lahontan Valley.

Spring Wings is a celebration of birding in and around Fallon, the Lahontan Valley Wetlands, and Stillwater Wildlife Refuge. The area lies on the Pacific Flyway and is home to hundreds of species of birds. Location of the celebration include the Churchill County Fairgrounds, Lahontan Valley Wetlands, and the Stillwater Wildlife Refuge.

March's Featured Location:
Stokes Castle near Austin, Nevada.



Stokes Castle, a three-story stone tower, is located just outside of Austin, Nevada. Started in the fall of 1896 and completed in June, 1897, by Anson Phelps Stokes, mine developer, railroad magnate and member of a prominent eastern family, as a summer home for his sons, principally J.G. Phelps. After the castle (or the tower, as the Stokes family always referred to it) was completed, it was used by the family for one brief period in June and July, 1897. Since then, with one possible exception, the structure has remained unoccupied. This iconic landmark is brightly lit at night as it welcomes travelers to the town of Austin.
